The last two weeks have been fairly quiet in the shop area of the Museum, but that does not mean that the Dog Days of August stopped all activity on the *City of Savannah* project.

The most visible event occurred on Tuesday, August 15, when we had the honor of a visit from one of our most ardent corporate supporters, LMI Corporation's President and CEO, Ron Saks.
