## UPDATE # 116 - "CITY OF SAVANNAH" B-17 Restoration April 3, 2012

We have to apologize for the long delay in the arrival of this Update. Things have been very busy at the Museum and we have also lost several key members of the management team. Hopefully we are finally catching up with the administrative chores associated with the project.

Work continues from the nose of the aircraft to the tail turret. The Wednesday Night Riders are meeting weekly with our Gulfstream "Metal Man", Jim Moriarty (with no "i" – really), to complete the reconstruction of the nose of the *City*. Jim reports that placement of the new metal supports in the nose will take place in the next few weeks. Our own John Finch is constructing the ring that will support the chin turret. Meanwhile, at the other end of the airplane, Jack Nilsen has begun the disassembly of the Grissom AFB Cheyenne tail turret so that he can make templates and finish the construction of our turret.

The wings of the aircraft have been seeing a great deal of action in the last few weeks. The Special Projects team, led on this occasion by Paul Abare, completed a de-fogging of the *City's* gas tanks

Meanwhile, the Saturday crew's electricians have been working for several weeks to get the landing lights operating. More ladders have been standing in the wing area as the Wednesday Day Crew completed painting the propellers. Decals and yellow paint on the tips will be the final step in this process.

Several Updates ago we mentioned that Wednesday Day Crew member Bud Curry had discovered replica rubber strips that would be ideal for *City's* de-icing boots. Paul Abare was familiar with the rubber strips in question and contacted his brother at the family homestead in New Hampshire. Presto, all the required rubber was delivered to the Museum, at no charge. A major *THANK YOU* goes out to the Abare family for this generous gift. The boots are already installed on the horizontal stabilizers and will soon appear on the rudder and wings.
