UPDATE # 97 - "CITY OF SAVANNAH" B-17 Restoration May 4, 2011

Our update this week has to begin with some very sad news. We were notified on Thursday of the death of Mr. Arnold Kolb on May 27th, while he was visiting family in Alexandria, Virginia. Arnold was the last private owner of our B-17, 44-83814, aka the "City of Savannah". He owned the airplane from 1971 until 1984, when he flew as the co-pilot with his son Nathan in the pilot seat on 814's last flight, from Puma, Arizona, to Chantilly, Virginia. The aircraft was then placed in storage by the Smithsonian Institution until it was presented as a gift to the Mighty Eighth Air Force Museum in Savannah, Arnold's daughter, Maurita Autrey, arranged for Arnold to speak to several Museum staff and volunteers about 814's life as part of Black Hills Aviation Corporation, the company that Arnold had founded and owned for many years. Arnold had mentioned several times that he hoped to be on hand when the restoration of the aircraft was finished and its dedication took place. He will not be at that affair, but you can be sure that members of the Kolb family will be present, and that Arnold's name and the story of his relationship to our B-17 will be well noted.

Everyone connected with our project has heard about the fantastic support we have gotten since the inception of the project from LMI Corporation. Most recently all of the fabric covered control surfaces for the "*City of Savannah*" arrived at the museum after two years of restoration work by LMI employees working as volunteers with after-hour efforts on our behalf. LMI's point man in Savannah is David Pinegar, who has coordinated all of this LMI volunteer effort.
