spare parts that arrived in the four wooden crates that came with the B-17. Many of

these parts were unidentifiable to anyone working with the project. Sheila Saxon put Ron's pictures into a boxed format and placed the pictures in a loose leaf notebook which Jerry took down to Douglas for the meeting with Don Brooks and Tom Reilly. While Don talked with our team Tom went through the book and was able to name every part for us. Thanks also to Mort Glick who helped Ron get the job done in time for the book to make the trip to Douglas.

Up in Maryland the project's research historian, Doug Reed, has been doing an absolutely amazing job turning up information on both our aircraft, and the original "City of Savannah".
